

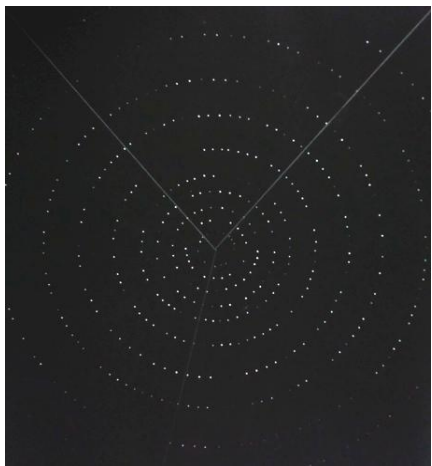
THE PHOTOGRAPHY POST

Sheree Hovsepien's Cosmic Minimalism

Noting the new work on [Sheree Hovsepien's](#) site and being sad to have missed the show, I asked [Heidi Norton](#) to write a bit about the pieces as she saw them.



With the complete immersion of digital technology into modern life, we see more and more artists focus on materiality and the physical, particularly within the medium of photography. With Sheree Hovsepien's work we see the artist photographing black holes punched into aluminum and reassembled through digital collage. The backgrounds are archival inkjet prints of holes recorded onto film.

Her process is slow and meditative and very much integral to the work. Using nails and string, she created these formal cosmic landscapes referencing string art of the 70's. Titles such as, "Coming Down" and "The Perfect Prescription" suggest that the graphite applied to the surface is a mediating activity of the artist. Both confusing and beautiful in their minimal nature these images serve their purpose in that they take you to another place other than modern life. Enjoy!



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
